IUM ALUMNI REMEMBERS THE LATE HON. MINISTER OF WORKS, TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION HON. MOSES AMWEELO

Born in Northern Namibia, in the Okatana Constituency of the Oshana Region on 25 May 1952 and departed this world on 24 June 2025, the late Hon. Moses Amweelo was an extraordinary person and was considerate and compassionate towards others. His kind disposition was characterised by desires to help others. He was a friend to IUM in the true sense of the word.

The late Hon. Moses Amweelo left Namibia in 1975 to join the armed Liberation Struggle for the total liberation of Namibia from the colonial "apartheid" South African regime. Hon. Moses Amweelo was a veteran SWAPO Party politician. He served as the Minister of Works, Transport and Communication from 2000 until 2005. In addition, he served as a member of the National Assembly from 2000 until 2010. The late Moses Amweelo also held several portfolios within the SWAPO Party and in the Namibian Parliament. He was also Deputy Chief Whip of SWAPO and served on numerous committees. He was passionate about education and taught part-time at IUM and UNAM.

The late Hon. Amweelo has an extensive academic background. He obtained his Ph.D. Degree from the International Transport Academy,

The late Hon. Moses Amweelo has left a huge foot print in the Namibian Liberation struggle, in the Namibian Government, in academia and beyond. He has authored a total of 108 article and 10 in international science journals.

ASSESSING THE EFFECTS OF EMOTIONAL
INTELLIGENCE, PSYCHOLOGICAL CAPITAL, AND
WORKPLACE DIVERSITY ON EMPLOYEE
PERFORMANCE IN STATE-OWNED
FNTFRPRISES IN NAMIBIA

ABSTRACT

This study assessed the effects of Emotional Intelligence, Psychological Capital, and Workplace Diversity on Employee Performance within Namibian State-Owned Enterprises. Grounded in the theoretical frameworks of social cognitive theory, social identity theory, social categorisation theory, goal-setting theory, and the resource-based view, the research adopted a post-positivist philosophy and employed a quantitative, explanatory research design.

A multi-stage sampling technique was used to collect data from employees across six Tier 2 SOEs through structured questionnaires. The data were analysed using Partial Least Squares Structural Equation Modelling (PLS-SEM). The findings revealed that emotional intelligence significantly influenced psychological capital, which in turn had a strong positive effect on employee performance. Workplace diversity also enhanced performance, but only when inclusive practices and psychological safety were present. Notably, emotional intelligence did not directly influence employee performance, highlighting the mediating roles of psychological capital and workplace diversity.

A new integrated research model was developed to illustrate the dynamic interplay among these variables, offering both theoretical contributions and practical insights for leadership, human resource management, and organisational development. The study concluded that organisations aiming to improve performance should invest in developing employees emotional and psychological capacities while fostering inclusive and equitable work environments.

DEVELOPING AN INTEGRATED LANDSCAPE
MANAGEMENT FRAMEWORK FOR IIPUMBU YA
TSHILONGO CONSERVANCY, NAMIBIA

ABSTRACT:

The study analysed how unsustainable land use and land management practices in lipumbu ya Tshilongo Conservancy, Namibia, are causing land degradation, affecting livelihoods and posing a threat to the conservancy's landscape. Proving that sustainable land use planning based on scientific assessments is crucial, the study used a mixed-method approach to assess land degradation in lipumbu ya Tshilongo Conservancy. It used satellite images from 1972, 2002, and 2022 to detect changes in land cover.

Results showed an increase in cultivated land and a decrease in forest cover, leading to an increase in the high degradation category. A qualitative approach assessed the drivers of land degradation and sustainable land management practices. The results showed that population increases between 1972 and 2022 in the Conservancy led to the clearing of more natural land for cultivation, which reduced forest cover and changed the natural environment. This has led to the degradation of 13.1% of the land in lipumbu ya Tshilongo Conservancy.

The study developed an integrated landscape management framework for sustainable conservancy resource utilization and livelihood upliftment, emphasizing the need for integrated approaches to reverse land degradation.

Mr. Sacky Nanhepo grew up in Okongo and used to commute every weekday from his village, Olukumwa, to Oluwaya Combined School, a distance of roughly 9 km. Oluwaya is where he completed Grades 1 to 10. After passing Grade 10, he moved on to complete Grades 11 and 12 at Oshela Senior Secondary School.

Mr. Nanhepo was raised alongside his sibling, just the two of them. They had to take on many responsibilities early on in life. Both of their biological parents passed away when they were still young. Sadly, he never experienced the love of his biological parents only that of step-parents.

After completing Grade 12, he took on a contract position teaching kindergarten. A year later, he worked as a cashier at Usave. During that time, he realised he wanted more for himself. He decided to upgrade his points and pursue further studies.

In 2017, he obtained a Certificate in Occupational Health and Safety from Tulipohamba Training and Assessment Institute. While job hunting, he worked as a security guard for Namibia Protection Services (NPS) in Windhoek. In 2019, he was determined to change his circumstances and he registered at the International University of Management (IUM) to pursue a Bachelor of Education in Senior Primary (Honours).

Being a self-funded student came with its own challenges. He was rejected by NSFAF due to missing documents specifically the death certificates of his parents. Despite the disappointment, he did not give up. Around that time, he heard that Hurricane Security was hiring

security personnel and submitted his CV, was shortlisted, interviewed and was was successfully appointed as a Security Guard supervisor.

This new chapter was not easy. He stood at the university gate, guarding the premises. But he remained focused and motivated. Balancing work and studies was extremely tough, especially with challenging courses like Mathematics and Science. He rarely relaxed using weekends and late nights when it was quiet and there were no disturbances to do his assignments.

Paying for tuition was another battle. Even without consistent financial support or sponsorships, he pressed on. At times, he thought of putting his studies on hold, but instead, he sacrificed buying anything unnecessary so that his tuition could be paid.

He graduated in 2023. It was a huge milestone worth celebrating, especially after struggling with Mathematics assignments. But the journey didn't end there. Post-graduation, he joined many others chasing teaching interviews, travelling across towns and regions, often feeling like a tourist looking for purpose.

During those times, he was still working at the IUM gate. It was not easy. But he held on to the belief that "hard times never kill a person unless they're not serious".

In 2024, he received his first teaching opportunity. A one-month relief teaching contract. It gave him the boost he needed to keep pushing. In 2025 he was officially appointed as a full-time teacher.

Therefore, it is important to stay connected with your alma mater and fellow graduates. Be part of a network that offers exclusive opportunities, professional growth, and lifelong friendships.






